

Rotary is an International Organization

- There are 1.2 million Rotary Club members in over 200 countries throughout the world.
- Our club, Corning Rotary Club, is in District 7120 which is comprised of 66 clubs with 2088 members (15 clubs not recorded).
- The district covers 11 counties over 90 square miles in upstate New York.

In the beginning...

Rotary Founder Paul Harris

- The first Rotary club was organized in Chicago in 1905, by Paul P. Harris.
- The club, with four members, met in rotation at the offices of the members thus the name Rotary.
- There are approximately 1.2 million members in over 30,000 clubs worldwide.

Women in Rotary


- Women were admitted to the Corning Rotary Club in 1989.
- There have been four women presidents since 1989 (Ann Clarke, Nora Smith, Cathy Crandall and Laurie Charleton)
- 24 % of the Corning Rotary Club Members are women.

Service Above Self

- Rotary soon realized that more than fellowship was needed to keep a group together — there needed to be a purpose.
- The first service project was placing public restrooms in downtown Chicago, IL, USA.
- Rotary became the world's first service club.



Rotary Youth Exchange Program

- 16-18 year olds are exchanged world-wide.
- Part of a 7,000 students/year program.
- Rotarians host these young people in their homes for three to five months.
- Students become part of the family.
- Corning has hosted students from 17 countries.



The Rotary Club of Corning Interact Clubs

- Our club sponsors the East and West High School Interact Clubs
 - High School students learn the value of community service through Rotary.
 - Students from age 14 to 18 are invited to participate in Rotary functions, volunteer for projects and attend weekly lunch meetings.
 - Corning Interact students work at the LPGA and other volunteer activities.

◆Third. The application of the ideal of service by every Rotarian to his or her personal, business and community life;



Fourth. The advancement of international understanding, good will, and peace through a world of fellowship of business and professional people united in the ideal of service.

Vocational Service

 The promoting of the "ideal of service" throughout the business and professional world.

Community Service

 Urges every Rotarian to participate in all activities that make the community a better place in which to live.

International Service

 Encourages and fosters the advancement of understanding and good will among people of the world.

Board service is by invitation from a current board member. The President-Elect chooses a Vice President for the next year
