PROGRAM: Dick Pope made the formal introduction outlining Wendell's career since he joined Corning in 1983 to his present position as Chairman and CEO. In 2008-2009 he was made an Honorary Member of Corning Rotary.

Before Dick's introduction Barry had fun claiming that Wendell was one of a few Harvard graduates that came back with the same name then asking his son, Quinn to bring up the Steve Jobs bio. He related the story on pages 491-492 in which Steve could not reach Wendell on the phone nor could Wendell reach Steve which started a friendship.

Wendell began with the financial situation noting that their cash reserve is great than their debt and that although sales and profits are down Corning is in a strong financial position. Corning has high corporate values and takes the long view as what is best for the company, its employees and the



communities. They need from time to time to take difficult cost cutting measures such as layoffs (totaling 100 locally) and hiring freezes. Decisions

involving people are the toughest. The LCD market is maturing, but remains strong with increased sales and long tem agreements reached with set makers.

One billion devices now use Gorilla glass. Corning must remain diverse both in its products and in the markets it serves with 78% of its market outside the country. They continue to diversify their products and their processes. Innovative display technologies have led to sharper colors and higher resolution. The higher temperature capabilities of Lotus result in devices with higher pixels. Willow, an extremely thin glass, five times thinner than its predecessor, is thinner than dollar bills.

Antimicrobial glass promises to be a winner. Wendell stated that smart phones have ten times the bacteria than on a public toilet seat. The capacity of optical fiber continues to increase and their Mobile Systems were used for the Super Bowl and both political conventions. Corning continues to push the frontier. The future looks bright.
